GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. DRESS CODE:

- 1.0. All the students should be dressed in neat and formal wear. Boys should tuck in their shirts and girls should pin their shawls.
- 1.1. T-shirts and Shirts with captions / psychedelic colors are not permitted.
- 1.2. Students should wear shoes while attending classes / laboratories / workshops. Use of Slippers is strictly prohibited.
- 1.3. Students must attend laboratories / workshops in the prescribed uniform only.
- 1.4. During educational tours students should dress in a way that will be fit the culture and rules of the Institution.
- 1.5. Students violating the dress code will be brought to the notice of the disciplinary Committee / Principal for necessary action.
- 1.6. All the students are expected to come in proper dress code by wearing latest ID card.

2. ATTENDANCE / LEAVE :

- 2.0. Students are expected to obtain 100% attendance. They should maintain a minimum of 75% attendance in each subject. Taking leave on medical grounds is unavoidable & absence due to participation in sports, in co-curricular or extracurricular activities etc., shall be limited to 25% of attendance.
- 2.1. Those who secure less than 75% of attendance will not be permitted to take up the examinations as per the autonomous regulations. However, in special cases with exceptional situations those who secure less than 75% and above 65% will be permitted to take up examinations on specific permission with Medical Certificate only once during the entire programme of study with the Principal acknowledgement.
- 2.2. Attendance on the reopening day and last working day of every semester is mandatory.
- 2.3. Students should not absent themselves from classes without proper leave application from Parents / Guardians.
- 2.4. Absence for one period either in the forenoon or in the afternoon will be considered as half-a-day leave.
- 2.5. Prior permission is essential for availing leave and application for permission must be submitted to the Class Advisor.
- 2.6. On duty leave for a student is limited to a maximum of 10 days per semester. On duty leave may be availed for participating in any competition at Institutions / Universities like fine arts, sports, paper presentations, project work etc. Students should submit the on duty leave form duly signed by the faculty, class advisor and the Head of the Department in advance.
- 2.7. Permission to leave the College premises during working hours can be granted only by the Principal or HOD of the respective Dept., usually on request from the student by submitting a permission slip.
- 2.8. Medical Certificate should be produced for sick leave, if the student avails leave more than 3 days. Student should produce necessary evidence for the leave taken for various reasons.

- 2.9. All students doing their project work outside the campus should submit the relevant attendance certificate on return.
- 2.10. Students should get prior permission to bring their materials inside the college campus for doing project or other academic work and also should receive a gate pass to take back the material.
- 2.11. All the students are expected to obtain prior permission to avail leave. Absentees without prior permission will be viewed very seriously. Absent between the class hours will be viewed very seriously and an enquiry committee will enquire these students, based on their recommendations decision will be taken to attend the next classes. Hour wise absent report will be sent to the respective parents through SMS daily for all the periods both during the forenoon and afternoon session.

3. IDENTITY CARD:

- 3.0. Every student must wear the Identity Card inside the campus.
- 3.1. Students who have lost their ID Cards should make a written request to the Principal for a duplicate Identity Card.

4. PUNCTUALITY:

- 4.0. All the students (Days Scholars and Hostellers) are expected to be inside their respective class room before 8.43 am without any delay.
- 4.1. All the students are expected to observe the silent prayer by standing without making any noise. There should not be any movement during this silent prayer from 8.43 a.m to 8.45 am.
- 4.2. College main gate and all the Hostel gates will be closed at 8.45 am sharply. The late comers will not be permitted to go to the academic area beyond 8.45 am at any cost. Suitable punishment will be awarded to the habitual offenders.
- 4.3. Students are required to be regular and punctual in attending Classes / Workshops / Laboratories.
- 4.4. Students should be in their seats before the commencement of classes and observe proper classroom etiquette.

5. CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE:

Disciplinary Committee

- 5.0. A Disciplinary committee is constituted to monitor students' discipline effectively. The committee possesses the power to call the students directly for an enquiry on the issues which affects the students' discipline on and off the campus.
- 5.1. Students are expected to behave politely and in a courteous manner towards the faculty members.
- 5.2. Students shall rise up from their seats to greet the faculty members when they enter the class room and remain standing until they are asked to occupy their seats.
- 5.3. Students are strictly forbidden from smoking and consuming liquor and drugs. Those who indulge in such activities will have to face suspension / expulsion.
- 5.4. "No meeting of any kind" shall be held without prior written permission from the Principal.

- 5.5. Students should abstain from active participation in political and communal activities.
- 5.6. Any student who has been convicted in the court of law will not be allowed to continue his studies in the institution.
- 5.7. Disciplinary action on students who violate these above rules will include anyone of the following:
 - ✤ Fine
 - Suspension from attending classes and the student will be considered absent for those days.
 - Debarred from Autonomous End Semester Exam.
 - Expulsion from the Institution.
- 5.8. Students are not supposed to loiter in the Lawn or Food Court or outside the Class room during the Academic Hours (other than break time). Food Court will be kept open only during the break time and will be closed during academic hours. Hence the students are expected to come out of the Food Court before the completion of the Break time.
- 5.9. Boys and Girls moving around together as a pair in the Lawn or Food Court or in any other places should be strictly avoided. Boys and Girls should not sit together in Food Court. Defaulters noticed by the monitoring committee / CCTV will be punished very severely along with the intimation to the respective parents. These activities will be strictly monitored by a committee and the defaulter will be enquired by the committee, based on the recommendation of the committee if found necessary it will be intimated to their parents immediately and suitable action will be initiated.
- 5.10. From 4.30 pm 5.00 pm, the Boys and Girls should not stand as pair and talk to each other near the buses, in the lawns or in any other place inside the campus. Severe action will be initiated against the defaulters.

6. CELL PHONE :

- 6.0. Cell phones are to be switched off inside the academic buildings (Class rooms, Laboratories and Library) during the working hours (8.45 a.m to 5.00 p.m). If the students are found using the cell phone in the academic buildings, the cell phone would be seized and it will be returned at the end of the academic year.
- 6.1. All the students should deposit their Mobile phones by keeping it either in silent / switch off mode to their respective class representative / class advisor at 8.45 a.m. before commencement of daily test or classes. The deposited mobile phones will be kept in their respective class room in the lockers and will be returned back on completion of class by 4.30 p.m. Deposit of Mobile Phones is at their own risk; Institution will not be responsible for any loss.
- 6.2. The students are expected to deposit their mobile phones without any hindrance. If anyone is not willing to deposit their mobile phones can avoid bring it to the campus. A frequent surprise check will be carried out in all the classes and during this check if any student is found in possession of their mobile phones without depositing it to their class representative or advisor, it will be seized and will be returned only at the end of the semester.

7. UPKEEP CLEANLINESS AND SAFETY :

- 7.0. Students must take care of tools, apparatus given to them and observe safety rules and cleanliness in the laboratories and workshops.
- 7.1. Care should be exercised in handling the property of the Institution and any damage caused purposely will result in disciplinary action and recovery of the cost.
- 7.2. Throwing papers or ink on the floor / corridors / stair case is prohibited. Students should dispose all waste material into the dust bins provided.
- 7.3. Do not write anything on the walls, desks or on any college property.
- 7.4. Students are advised to switch off the fans and lights while leaving the classrooms / lab.
- 7.5. All the students are expected to keep our college campus neat and clean. Our campus is a "Litter Free Campus". The students are expected to put the waste papers and unwanted materials in dustbin wherever it is provided. The class rooms, labs, departments, verandas, travelling space, road, hostel, canteen, food court, steps, etc., should be kept neat and clean. If anybody found throwing the papers / unwanted materials by the monitoring committee / CCTV footage, a penalty of Rs. 2,000/- with a suitable punishment (giving a speech about cleanliness in each and every class room for 5 min) will be initiated.
- 7.6. All the students are instructed to help to maintain our campus as "Litter Free Campus" as a mission of Swatch Bharath.

8. FUNCTIONS AND MEETINGS:

- 8.0. Students are encouraged to participate actively in all the events, functions and meetings held in the college. They are expected to maintain perfect discipline while attending it.
- 8.1. Students are not allowed to hoot or whistle during functions like college day, hostel day, association meetings, etc. And any such behavior will be viewed seriously.
- 8.2. Outsiders should not be invited to any function without the permission of the Principal.

9. GUIDELINES TO PARENTS/GUARDIAN:

- 9.0. The parents can meet the Principal / Heads of Departments on working days.
- 9.1. Change of address / Phone numbers of parents should be promptly intimated to the Institution in written format.
- 9.2. Whenever the presence of parents / guardians is needed they should be present at the college at the request of the authorities.

10. ANTI-RAGGING COMMITTEE:

RAGGING :

RAGGING IS AN OFFENCE AND THE ACCUSED IS LIABLE TO BE ARRESTED AND IMPRISONED IN ADDITION TO BEING DISMISSED FROM THE COLLEGE.

"Ragging is certainly not a necessary stepping stone to friendship. Friendship can be made and maintained even without ragging. It is for the youth themselves to find some sane means of expressing friendship with their juniors. Respect forced out by ragging cannot be genuine respect. It is one way respect shown under duress, a semblance of respect tinged with fear, fear of more ill treatment. Putting a junior to shame certainly cannot make him respect his senior. It will only kindle fear and a silent despise for him at heart. The best solution for this problem is that youth should change their attitude, the barbaric idea of ragging anyone or subjecting him/her to any torture or shame in its name.

Anti Ragging Committee in SNS College of Technology is established as per the Guidelines of

- 1. UGC Regulations on curbing the Menace of Ragging in Higher Educational Institutions, 2009.
- 2. All India Council for Technical Education notified regulation for prevention and prohibition of ragging in AICTE approved technical institutions vide No.37-3/Legal/AICTE/2009 dated 01.02.2009.
- 3. Tamil Nadu prohibition of Ragging Act, 1997. Act No. 7 of 1997.

Definition

In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires, 'Ragging' means a display of noisy, disorderly conduct doing any act which causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm or raise apprehension or fear or shame or embarrassment to a student in any educational institution and includes.

- a) Teasing, abusing, of playing practical jokes on, causing hurt to such students.
- b) Asking the students to do any acts perform something which such student will not, in the ordinary course, be willing to do.

What constitutes Ragging :

Ragging constitutes one or more of any of the following acts:

- a. Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student.
- b. Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities by any student or students which causes or is likely cause annoyance, hardship, physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.
- c. Asking any students to do any act which such student will not in the ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame, or torment or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- d. Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.
- e. Exploiting the services of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- f. Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students.
- g. Any act of physical abuse including all variants of it: sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person;
- h. Any act or abuse by spoken words, e-mails, posts, public insults which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student;

i. Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.

Constitution of Anti Ragging Committee

The Anti-Ragging Committee is headed by the Principal, and also consisting of representatives from civil and police administration, local media, Non-Government Organizations, representatives of faculty members, representatives of parents, representatives of students belonging to the first year as well as senior students and non-teaching staff.

Constitution of Anti Ragging Squad

The Anti-Ragging squad is constituted in the institution which is headed by the Principal. The head of the departments, faculty members and non-teaching staff members will maintain vigil, oversight and monitor inside the institution and shall remain mobile, alert and active at all times to curb any kind of activities related to ragging.

Punishments for Ragging

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established the possible punishments for those found guilty of ragging at the institution level shall be any one or any combination of the following:

- a) Cancellation of admission
- b) Suspension from attending classes
- c) Withholding / Withdrawing scholarship / fellowship and other benefits
- d) Debarring from appearing in any test / examination or other evaluation process
- e) Withholding results
- f) Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival, etc.
- g) Suspension / expulsion from the hostel
- h) Rustication from the institution for period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters
- i) Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution.
- j) Imprisonment up to 2 years
- k) A fine up to Rs. 10,000/-

11. PREVENTION OF SEXUAL HARASSMENT CELL (POSH)

SNS College of Technology is committed to create a safe environment for girl students and women employees and an environment free of violence, harassment, exploitation, intimidation and stress. The prevention of Sexual Harassment Cell is set up in pursuance of the UGC guidelines and directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court in the judgment of Vishaka & Others v/s. State of Rajasthan & Others reported in 1997 (6) SCC 241, and as per the provisions of the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013.

Internal Complaints Committee is instrument in addressing the issues of sexual harassment and recommending their redressal in a time-bound manner. The committee consists of one Senior Women Professor of the institution as Co-ordinator, one women member from NGO and other women faculty members.

Objectives:

- To fulfill the directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, and concerns expressed by the University Grants Commission (UGC) about ensuring a safe environment for women students and employees in educational institutions.
- To promote an environment free of sexual harassment and other acts of gender-based discrimination at the institution that ensures gender equality and equal opportunities.
- To prevent sexual harassment and to promote the general well-being of female students, teaching and non-teaching women staff of the institution.

12. GRIEVANCE REDRESSAL COMMITTEE : (GRE)

In SNS College of technology, the grievance Redressal Committee is formed as per Clause 1 of section 23 of the AICTE Act, 1987 (52. of 1987) AICTE. The Committee has been formed to provide easy and readily accessible machinery for prompt disposal of the day to day genuine grievance of the students and to make the students to pursue their education in a congenial atmosphere. The committee headed by the Principal looks into the grievances of the students based on the complaints received from the students. The person concerned with any grievance shall file a complaint in writing with all possible facts and documentation and submit it to the Principal's office. It redresses the grievance at individual, class level and grievances of common interest. Complaints dropped in the 'Suggestion Box' by students and other oral and written complaints are also redressed. The grievances submitted by the students are addressed in a systematical manner to maintain necessary confidentiality in the handling process. The committee will investigate into the matter and shall try to resolve it as quickly as possible.

Objectives :

- 1. To introduce fair, impartial and consistent mechanism for Redressal of various issues faced by the students, faculty members, non-teaching staff and parents.
- 2. To develop a responsive and accountable attitude among all stakeholders, thereby maintaining a harmonious atmosphere in the institution.
- 3. To ensure that grievances are resolved promptly, neutrally and in complete confidentiality.

13. SC/ST CELL

The SC/ST cell adheres to the grievances of SC/ST students in the institution towards any kind of discrimination or any issues in receiving government scholarships. It provides inputs in the areas where students confront difficulties in both academic and social life. The cell is formed as per regulations of SC/ST (Prevention of Atrocities) Act, 1989, No.33 of 1989, dated 11.09.1989. The committee conducts meeting with the SC/ST students to attend and resolve any difficulties in personal, social and academic contexts.

14. STUDENTS MUST ABIDE THE FOLLOWING RULES STRICTLY

- Students are instructed to observe silence prayer by standing wherever they are at 8.43 am prayer bell.
- The students should not collect money for any purpose without getting the permission from the Principal.
- No notice or any kind of circulars shall be circulated by students or passed anywhere in the college campus without the prior permission from the Principal.
- Students are responsible for their personal belongings (Calculators, Cell Phones, Laptop etc). The college is not responsible for loss of property.

- Students should make it a habit to read the notice / circulars / visit Website and other papers displayed on the Notice Board and follow the direction given.
- Any property found in the premises must be handed over to the office with relevant details.
- Change of address is to be intimated to the office then and there.
- Students should park their vehicles in the space meant for parking.
- Students should wear Identity Cards, as long as they are in the College Campus.
- Proper dress code must be followed by the students while they are in the laboratory and in the classroom.

(IN ACADEMIC AND DISCIPLINARY MATTERS THE DECISION OF PRINCIPAL IS FINAL)

15. CLASS COMMITTEE MEETING

Class committee comprises of chairperson (who does not handle any course for that class), subject handling faculty members and a group of selected students', that is, boy and girl representative each from hostel and day-scholars, slow and advanced learners. Class committee meetings are convened at least twice in a semester to address issues related to academic / non-academic matters.

16. TUTOR WARD SYSTEM

Recognizing the need to establish a close interaction with the students '**Tutor Ward System**' have been implemented, where exchange of ideas and opinions are processed. The motive of Tutor Ward Session is to build a bond of academic relationship between the faculty and their wards. This faculty member is designated as the tutor for every individual student and will be on hand for consultation and advice on all matters i.e., academic and social. Each ward tutor is entrusted with a group of 20 to 24 students. Students are expected to meet the assigned faculty member and discuss the progress and problems in studies and extracurricular activities. Moreover, the tutor caters to the academic, psychological and emotional needs of the ward and maintains their progress reports and also acts as a liaison between the students and the parents. The rules and regulations, welfare measures, various scholarships available and the ways to approach them are explained to the wards. In nutshell, the tutors act as mentors who are always there to guide their wards towards their academic and career goals.

17. BEST OUTGOING STUDENT AWARD

An award for the "Best Outgoing Student" for the Final Year and All-Round Performer(ARP) Award for III & II year students is instituted for B.E / B.Tech., and the students are selected based on their overall performance in academics, Co-curricular and Extracurricular activities.

I. ADMISSIONS

- 1. Application for admission in the students residence must be made in the prescribed form only. Admission in the college does not automatically confer right of admission in the students Residence.
- 2. Every student, before getting admission in the students' residence should give an undertaking in writing that he/she will abide by the rules and regulations.
- 3. Before admission, each student has to pay admission fees, mess advance, caution deposit, room rent and other charges, which may be revised from time to time.

II. DISCIPLINE

- 1. Every student is expected to maintain strict discipline inside and outside the campus and uphold good name of the students residence and the institution.
- 2. Shouting, whistling or causing disturbance in the students' residence will be treated as breach of discipline.
- 3. Smoking is strictly prohibited. Any student found to have consumed intoxicating drinks / drugs will be dismissed from the students residence immediately without any enquiry.
- 4. The inmates must refrain from taking part in anti-social activities.
- 5. The inmates should neither involve themselves in any political activity nor be members of any political party or communal organization.
- 6. The inmates should not convene any meeting within the students residence or outside the students residence without the written permission of the Chief Warden.
- 7. The inmates are not allowed to put up or circulate any notice without the Chief Warden's permission.
- 8. Abnormal activities of any nature causing disturbance to neighbors should not be carried out in rooms.
- 9. The inmates should not fix nail on the walls for hanging their clothes & posters. Posters of any kind are prohibited within the students' residence.
- 10. The inmates should not remain in the hostel during the working hours / at other times when the presence is expected in the institution, except with the permission of the Deputy Warden.
- 11. No student should stay away from the student's residence for any reasons without the permission of the chief Warden / Deputy Warden.
- 12. Day scholars are not permitted to enter the students' residence.
- 13. Students shall be permitted to go out for outing only with the permission of Deputy Warden.
- 14. No person other than the boarder should enter the student's residence. If such contingency arises, permission should be obtained from the Deputy Warden. If anyone is present without permission, action will be taken against the boarder in whose room the person is found.
- 15. Audio system, Computer & other Electrical Appliances shall be used only with the prior permission of the Deputy Warden. Terms & conditions for the use of such

appliances will be stipulated from time to time. Audio & video systems including headphones should not be used after 8.30 p.m.

- 16. The inmates should treat others as their fellow brothers irrespective of their caste, creed & religion. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited. It is to be noted that ragging is the criminal offence under the law. Any student found ragging / hurting junior students by word or deed will be expelled from the hostel & college.
- 17. Celebrating birthday cutting cake is strictly prohibited.

III. MESS

- 18. Only Vegetarian food is served in the students residence according to the menu & the rates prescribed by the management.
- 19. Any student who is dismissed from the college will automatically cease to be an inmate of the student's residence.

- 25. No guest is allowed to stay in the hostel without written permission from the chief warden.
- 26. Hosteller falling sick is advised to inform Deputy Warden / resident tutor for necessary action. Taking treatment of their own should be at their own risk.
- 27. All inmates should return to students' residence premises before 6.30 p.m. Systematic computerized attendance will be taken at 8.30 p.m. every day. If they are found absent then their parents will be intimated through phone about their absence.
- 28. Students should conduct themselves in an orderly manner in the common room, where TV & other appliances are available.
- 29. Students should get prior permission of the Deputy Warden / Resident Tutor before moving out of the hostel for going home/local guardians place.

FEATURES OF AUTONOMOUS SYSTEM

As a part of continuous improvements in training effectiveness, additional training related infrastructures like exclusive study centers for Mechanical, Electrical & Electronic Appliances maintenance and reconditioning cells hands on experience cells in each division will be established. Executive Skill Development Programme (ESDP) and Supervisory Skill Development Programme (SSDP) will be conducted exclusively to students prior to the placement, which enhances their industry – readiness and multiplies their opportunities.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT CELL

The Research and Development Cell functioning at SNSCT is headed by the team consisting of the Director, Principal, and Dean EIE & BME and fully assisted by the experienced / Senior Faculty members of SNS College of Technology. Our institute encourages all faculty members to undertake sponsored research programmes / projects supported by different funding agencies such as DST, CSIR, DSIR, AICTE, UGC and the Ministry of Environmental Sciences to mention a few. The R&D cell of SNS College of Technology, intends to have collaborative research programmes in association with the Premier Research Laboratories and Institutes in India. Each department is encouraged to involve in different research and consultancy activities for the industries throughout the academic year. Research activities by various departments of the Institute can be monitored by the R&D Cell periodically.

The R&D cell would like to have healthy interactions between the institute and the industries, and this can be ensured through the following activities:

• Departments of Mechanical Engineering, Civil Engineering, Computer Science and Engineering, Electrical and Electronics Engineering, Electronics and Communication

Engineering are recognized as Research Department / R&D centers by the Anna University.

- Arranging, conducting Seminars and Workshops by experts from International Universities.
- All the Laboratories established by the 10 U.G Departments are having very good research facilities and could be used to conduct research and consultancy work.
- Separate P.G Research Laboratories in all the 10 P.G Departments are also available to carryout R&D work.
- The Research Scholars are encouraged to take up research, leading to M.S. (by research) and Ph.D. degrees.
- Proposals are sent to several funding agencies to get funds for the R&D projects.
- R&D projects funded by AICTE, AR&DB, UGC, DST, DRDO, ISRO, CSIR, Ministry of Power, etc., are encouraged and executed.
- Reputed industries are invited to have MoUs with SNSCT and the existing MoUs are effectively used for getting in-plant training, industrial visit, internship, consultancy and research projects for both the faculty members and students.

SEED MONEY

Research and Innovative clubs have been initiated to utilize the seed money scheme set up by the management to the students and the faculty members for developing innovative projects. Each department is given with a maximum amount of Rs. 1,00,000/- for faculty members and another Rs. 1,00,000/- for the students to initiate their innovative research works. The seed money can be used to purchase equipment, consumables, software's etc. for their research. Faculty members and students are utilizing the seed money given by the management to develop innovative research projects. So far, Rs.6,79,500 Lakh for 35 projects have been sanctioned.

Youth Red Cross is an association which was started to serve the needy people with an ample number of student volunteers. Youth Red Cross was started on 20th March 2004 at our college. In our college, this unit is functioning with 100 volunteers who are really interested, enthusiastic and service-minded. They have initiated and organized several programmes.

The programme focuses on the following areas:

- Promote life and health through training and education on safety measures, primary care, healthcare and healthy living.
- Encourage community service through training and education.
- Disseminate the seven fundamental principles of Red Cross and Red Crescent movement through activities that encourage the Red Cross ideals.
- Promote international friendship and with that cultivate humanitarian spirit.
- Technical support in the development of youth programmes fund-raising, identification of material and human resources.

RED RIBBON CLUB

There are about 120 student volunteers in this club who were trained to create awareness among the people in the society about these diseases. The club organizes voluntary camps with the help of the student volunteers under the guidance of the RRC-Officer. PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Sports play a significant role in the life of students at SNSCT. The department of Physical Education covers an area of 2.5 acres located in the college premises. The department

is headed by a Physical Director and an Assistant Physical Director. The department has infrastructures for all the indoor and outdoor games.

There are sufficient facilities in the campus for both field events and indoor games for the students to practice and to conduct the Inter-Collegiate tournaments and Intramural Sports. The college is equipped with five indoor shuttle courts, one Football field, one Basket ball court with fiber glass boards and pressure release rings with lighting facility, one Handball court, two Volleyball courts, two Ball Badminton courts, three Tennikoit courts, one Kho-Kho court, two Cricket pitch, Kabhadi court, throw ball court for net practice and one wellmaintained pitch for matches. Independent facilities are available for both boys and girls. A Gym (2000 square feet) is attached to the department in which a number of single and multi stationed machines and other weight training accessories are available to provide opportunity for the students to train themselves to keep their body athletic and also a separate gym for girls (1000 square feet) is available inside girls' hostel.

Its prime aim is to explore the hidden talents of the students and offer opportunities to unearth the potential of the student community.

The students of the club are performing well in the inter college music competitions and bagged many prizes and laurels to the college besides their extra ordinary performance inside the campus.

Dance is another art form which is a symbol of civilization and culture. Dance club of SNSCT has been a gathering place for students to learn, create, enjoy and appreciate the art. 28.	Cases of Impersonation	 (i) Handing over the impersonator to the police with a complaint to take appropriate action against the person involved in the impersonation by the Chief Superintendent. (ii) If a student of this College is fond to impersonate a 'bonafide student', the impersonating student is debarred form continuing his/her studies and writing the examinations permanently. He/she is not eligible for any further admission to any programme of the College.
